Volleyball debuts three-class system

Volleyball will enter a new era this fall, as the sport follows in the footsteps of basketball toward a three-class system.

Following the same action that realigned the divisions for basketball, the N.D. High School Activities Association finalized a three-division volleyball system that will go into effect this fall.

Previously, volleyball was split between Class A and Class B. Now, it will be Division AA, Division A and Division B.

The plan divides schools into AA, A and B classes based on an enrollment formula. Both

schools in Hettinger County are in Division B.
Eight districts and four regions now comprise
Division B.

The tournament schedule will follow the footsteps of basketball tournament as well.

District tournaments will qualify four teams in each district to advance to regional tournaments. Eight teams will advance to the state tournament from within the four regions, including the first-place team from each region and those who win challenge games to earn second place and a qualifying state berth, similar to the basketball tournaments.

The state tournament will be played Nov. 20-22 at the Bismarck Event Center, with all three divisions playing on the same weekend at the same venue.

The Region 4 District 7 teams include Beach, Belfield, Bowman County, Glen Ullin-Hebron, Grant County, Hettinger/Scranton, Mott-Regent, New England, Richardton-Taylor and South Heart.

The Region 4 District 8 teams are Center-Stanton, Central McLean, Flasher, Garrison, Mandaree, New Salem-Almont, Standing Rock Community, Washburn, White Shield and Wilton-Wing.

The plan for a three-class system for boys and girls basketball moved forward for the 2023-24 seasons.

Cross-country teams start season

The cross-country teams started their season at the Killdeer Early Bird Meet Aug. 22.

Under a new contract for services between the Mott-Regent and New England school districts, the schools are making both golf and cross-country available to all their students.

Breanna Erickson placed 59th with a time of 16:52.

For Mott-Regent, junior Kara Roll placed 37th with a time of 15:16.

Just two boys competed in Killdeer for New England.

In the 3,000-meter varsity race, sophomore Beau Keith clocked a 13:29 time for 62nd place, while senior Mark Schmidt took 102nd place with a time of 16:10.50 in his debut race.

The runners are being coached by

Justin Kathrein, a 2023 graduate of New England High School who competed in cross-country while in high school.

The team will next compete in the Bowman County Invite Friday. Aug. 29, then at the Beulah-Hazen invite Sept. 5.

Following a full schedule in September and October, the Class B West Region Meet will take place in Beulah Oct. 11, with the Class B state meet held in Jamestown on Oct. 24.
