OF HETTINGER COUNTY **COMMISSIONERS** August 6, 2025

Chairman Tom Geerts called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. with roll call of commissioners with Todd Lutz and Devan Laufer attending. Elliott Finck, Road Supervisor, was in attendance.

Laufer motioned to approve the minutes from the July meeting, seconded by Lutz. All in favor, motion carried. Lutz motioned to approve the agenda, seconded by Laufer. All in favor, motion carried.

Lutz motioned to approve, seconded by Laufer. All in favor, motion carried.

Offices met with the commissioners to give their monthly reports. This included the Tax Director, Register of Deeds/ Clerk of Court, Emergency, Sheriff and the Road Department

Kyle DeMark, Emergency Manager, mentioned that the Radio Tower inspection was completed and recommended keeping the tower and continue using as is until the SIRN system is utilized in the next year or two. All the emergency services were contacted.

Jessica Buer & Andrea Bowman, representing Roos-evelt-Custer Regional Council and as JDA Director met with the council to discuss Explore Hettinger County web pages on the County website. Tracy Kruger, who has been working with our website also attended at this time. After discussion, Lutz motioned to approve the JDA web page expansion on the county website, seconded by Laufer. All in favor, motion carried.

Eric Urness, Brosz Engineering, submitted to the board the bridge priority listing and map for the board to review prior to submitting to the state for the

Bridge Flex funding.
The Slope County Commissioner via conference call, discussed a road that is in both counties. This road leads into the west side of the city of New England. They were wondering if our county would be interested in submitting a multi-jurisdictional grant with Slope County being the contact county. Laufer motioned to approve, seconded by Lutz. All in favor, motion carried.

Per last legislature session, the county and other taxing entities must have a policy in place for public comment at their meetings. Laufer motioned to approve the following resolution: HETTINGER COUNTY POLICY REGARDING PUBLIC COM-MENT AT REGULAR MEET-INGS: WHEREAS, as a North Dakota political subdivision, the Hettinger County and its Board of County Commissioners (the "Board") are subject to North Dakota's open meetings requirements under Chapter

If a brand is allowed to expire, ownership interest of the brand will be lost and the brand may no longer be used. In August, a renewal notice for each recording was mailed to the address on file in the brand recording office. 44-04 of the North Dakota Century Code. WHEREAS, during the 2025 Legislative Session, the North Dakota Legislature approved SB 2180, a bill that includes a new public meeting requirement in Chapter 44-04 for cities, counties, townships, school Boards, park Boards, and water resource Boards (the "Public Entities"). WHEREAS, under SB 2180, at every regularly scheduled meeting, the Public Entities must include an opportunity for members of the public to provide comments. WHEREAS, SB 2180 requires the Public Entities to implement policies that include rules for public comments, including time limits for public speakers, total meeting time limitations for public comment, rules regarding permissible topics, and rules of decorum. NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this RESOLUTION OF POLICY represents the Board's official policy regarding public comments at regular board meetings as mandated under SB 2180. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board's policy under this RES-OLUTION OF POLICY ensures the public's right to speak at a regular meeting and ensures the public comment process is orderly, efficient, and respectful. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board approves the following policy regarding public comments at the Board's meetings, under SB 2180: 1. The Board will include a public comment agenda item as the first non-procedural agenda item at all regular meetings of the a. "Regular" meetings include the Board's regularly scheduled monthly meetings, as approved by the Board and filed with the Hettinger County Auditor, all as required under N.D. Cent. Code § 44-04-20(3).

2. Each person interested in providing public comments at a meeting must submit a speaker card, in person or via email, to the County Auditor, as clerk of the Board of County Commissioners, prior to the meeting being called to order that includes: a. the person's name;

b. the person's address; and c. an agenda item from the current meeting agenda or the previous meeting agenda that the person seeks to address.

1. If a speaker card does not include all three items above, the person is disqualified and the person may not speak at the

2. The Board will afford each person three minutes to provide comments. The Board will notify each speaker when the three minutes have expired and the speaker will promptly conclude.

3. To ensure orderly and efficient meetings, the Board will limit the public comment agenda item to a total of thirty minutes, regardless of how many people have submitted speaker cards.

4. The Board will call on each person who has properly submitted a completed speaker card to present public comments, in the order of submis-

a. address the agenda item identified on the speaker card, from the current meeting agenda or the previous meeting agenda; and

5 All comments must:

b. be pertinent to the Board. 6. Comments may not:

a. be defamatory, abusive, harassing, or unlawful;

b. include information that is exempt or confidential under North Dakota open records or open meetings law; or

c. interfere with the orderly conduct of the Board's meeting. Speakers may not yield their allotted time to another

person. 8. Anyone unable or unwilling to speak in-person may submit written comments to the County Auditor, as clerk of the Board of County Commissioners, prior to the meeting; the written comments must include the person's name and address and must be pertinent to an agenda item from the current meeting agenda or the previous meeting agenda. If a person submits written comments to the County Auditor at least twenty-four hours prior to

the Board's meeting, the Auditor will circulate and distribute the comments to the Commissioners prior to the meeting and the Board will address and discuss the comments at the meeting. If a person submits written comments to the County Auditor less than twenty-four hours prior to a meeting, the Board will not address or discuss the comments at that meeting and the County Auditor will circulate and distribute the comments to the Com-

missioners after the meeting.
BE IT FURTHER RE-SOLVED that this RESOLU-TION OF POLICY supersedes any of the Board's previous policies or practices regarding public comments at the Board's meetings.

Lutz seconded the motion. Roll Call - Laufer "aye"; Lutz "aye", Geerts "aye" motion carried.

An increase of cost for the new condensate pump was received due to tariff, and Lutz motioned to approve the order, seconded by Laufer. All in favor, motion carried.

New (non-public safety) employees are now to be put on Defined Contribution Plan for the counties NDPERS retirement plan. Lutz motioned to approve the plan with the counties contribution to match the plans max contribution to make it more in line with what the current employees have in the Defined Benefit Plan, seconded by Laufer. All in favor, motion

Youth deer season opens

Friday, Sept. 19, at noon CT signals the start of a nine-and-ahalf-day deer hunting season for licensed youth hunters.

The youth license is valid during the youth deer season that closes Sept. 28, and the regular deer gun season running from Nov. 7-23.

After opening day, hunting hours are a half-hour before sunrise to a half-hour after sunset. Orange ciotning is required for youth hunters and mentors.

Each young deer hunter must be under direct supervision of an adult. The adult is prohibited from carrying a firearm or bow while accompanying the youth hunter in the

field during the youth season.

Youth, military waterfowl weekend

Introduce a youngster to duck hunting during North Dakota's two-day youth waterfowl season Sept. 20-21. In addition, the special veteran and active military personnel waterfowl season is set for the same weekend.

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department has Virtual Duck Hunting Mentor webpage with all the basics, including license requirements, regulations, gear recommendations and tips for finding a place to hunt.

Legally licensed resident and nonresident youth waterfowl hunters 15 and younger, and veterans and members of the Armed Forces on active duty, including members of the National Guard and Reserves on active duty (other than for training), may hunt ducks, geese, coots and

mergansers statewide.

All waterfowl hunters must possess a waterfowl habitat restoration electronic stamp.

Resident and qualifying nonresident youth waterfowl hunters must possess a general game and habitat license.

Veterans and members of the Armed Forces must possess a resident hunting license, which includes a general game and habitat license and a small game license.

Hunters 16 and older must also possess a federal waterfowl stamp, and youth 12 and older need to have passed a certified hunter education course.

In addition, all hunters must be Harvest Information Program certified. Hunters who do not HIP certify when they buy a North Dakota license can add it by visiting the state Game and Fish Department website at gf.nd.gov.
