the quilt. The pieced top is then returned to be long armed, binding of the quilt, the label added, and the quilt laundered."

In order to be eligible for a Quilt of Valor, the recipient must be an eligible service member or veteran who has received an honorable discharge, and served during wartime or otherwise 'touched by war'. The individual being nominated must also be made aware, and no surprise awards are permitted.Recipients are then honored at ceremonies held throughout the year.

"As of April 10, 2025, we have awarded approximately 704 Quilts of Valor," said Miessel. "In 2025, we have awarded 40 Quilts of Valor. 2024 has been our busiest year, with 217 quilts awarded."

On the evening of Wednesday, April 23rd, another dozen were awarded at the Bismarck Amyets Center- where twelve veterans and active service members from multiple wars were the guests of honor. After a complimentary dinner, trooping the colours, and brief speeches highlighting their military careers, they were applauded by attendees and wrapped in their respective quilts by friends and family members. Each quilt was also paired with a special thank-you card as well as a star from a decommissioned American flag, and those who fought in the Vietnam War were also able to receive commemorative coins and pins. For many of the veterans in question, this marks one of the rare events where they truly feel thanked for their service, and it can be an incredibly emotional experience.

"It was an honor to be here with so many veterans-from Vietnam, Korea, and even the Gulf War- and to be applauded for my service," said Lt. Colonel and Engineer **Battalion Commander** Steven Bohl. "It's great that the program is focusing on honoring those veterans who didn't get the thanks they should have, especially Vietnam and Korean War vets. I was here for a few memorials, and have seen Vietnam Vets release a lot of the anxiety and stress they've had buried away for so long simply by being embraced and thanked. It's like standing on the shoulders of giants- all the agencies involved combining to make sure veterans get the appreciation they deserve."

"I'm a little bit overwhelmed," said Sgt. 1st Class Brett Miller. "Maybe I'm a little bit modest, but I always viewed my work as something that was just part of our lives. Being recognized for that can sometimes be a bit overwhelming, but any organization that recognizes what we do is very beneficial. Not everybody gets that privilege, but it's helpful and beneficial for everybody to be honored

for the service they provide. As a member of Public Affairs, I've had a chance to cover multiple veteran ceremonies. I think they put into perspective just how widespread veterans are-it isn't just people my age, but a multigenerational honor."

"When the quilt is first wrapped around you," said former Air Force Nurse Ila Reich, "you get this feeling of security. It's amazing. As a nurse, you're supposed to be professional and not show any emotion, but sometimes all of us need to be human beings. The entire experience is very humbling... and I'd just like to thank everybody for treating us well. The generosity, sincerity, and overall experience are all overwhelming."

Regardless of whether or not they are thanked, though, the quilters state that doing good and ensuring their veterans are honored is its own reward, and that they'll continue to do their part as long as they can.

"We do not do this for us or for recognition," said Meissel. "We do this for our veterans and service members. It is a small token of appreciation for what they do, and have done for our country and community. Through the nominations and award ceremonies, our members have met so many wonderful and deserving veterans, service members, and their families. It comforts us knowing these quilts are accomplishing the mission."

Those who wish to join the Missouri River branch can do so by visiting the church during meetings, the group's Facebook page, or their website at missouririverqov.weebly. com. While previous experience with quilting is required for the sewing and kit creation process, volunteers can also assist by writing cards and aiding with distribution.
