## Langdon Cardinals Face Off Oakes Tornadoes in First Varsity Game of the Season



up to Langdon for a rematch of last years opening round playoff game as they took on for the 7th time Langdon Area-Munich. It would end up being the Jax Johnson show as the Cardinal quarterback would dominate the Tornado defense to get the 34-6

The game started out with an opening kick return all the way to near the Oakes 35 by Eastyn Schaefer and 3 quick plays later Johnson would be running it in from the 1 yard line to

make it 7-0 under a minute into the game. Oakes would try to respond but Beau Thorpe would be intercepted by Johnson on the 2nd play of the Tornadoes' opening drive. Johnson would then run it in from 7 yards out with 5:50 left to go in the 1st quarter making it 14-0. Oakes would then put together a promising drive marching down the field with several explosive runs from Braysen Sagert and a few passes from Thrope. However as Oakes would get within touching distance of the

red zone Thorpe would once again be picked off this time by Dawson Downs with 2:06 left to go. Oakes would get the ball back however as Theo Romfo would fumble it less than half a minute later with Jacob Ptacek landing on the loose ball. Oakes would then be forced on a 3 and out to essentially end the quarter.

The opening play of the 2nd quarter saw Reese Nitschke get in on the turnover game as he'd pick off Johnson on the opening drive of the quarter.

Oakes' offense however would once again be forced to punt. The Cardinals would put together a long drive with the Tornadoes unable to stop them several times on 3rd down before Johnson would hit Tanner McDonald for a 40 yard touchdown pass with 5:17 left in the half making it 21-0. Oakes would once again see their drive stall out and give Johnson the ball back. He would make them pay as this time he'd run the ball in from 34 yards out with 1:53 left on the clock to

make it 28-0 going into the half. Oakes would start with the ball in the 2nd half but their drive would again stall out. Langdon would see Johnson one last time march down the field and throw a 7 yard touchdown pass to Schaefer making it 34-0 with 8:12 left in the half. Neither team would find success after that with stalled drives going deep into the 4th quarter when Oakes would march down the field and Thorpe would find Zade Heier in the endzone on a 30 yard pass to make sure

Oakes would not be shut out making the final score 34-6. The Bank North Player of the Game was Reese Nitschke. Next up for the Tornadoes is a bye week before their home opener on September 5th when they play host to Hillsboro-Central Valley. Minutes, Auditor and Police Reports: J. Hollingsworth moved, Harris second to approve minutes with correction to Mayor's name as noted, carried. Harris moved, D. Hollingsworth second to approve police report, carried, Harris moved, Day second to approve auditor reports, carried

Building Permits: Sidewalk removal, S 150' Of Outlot H Letter Outlots: after discussion of highway 1 rightof-way J. Hollingsworth moved, Kelly second to approve removal of sidewalk up to highway 1 easement line. carried. Homeowners should contact ND DOT if they wish to remove additional sidewalk in easement area. D. Hollingsworth moved, Harris second to approve Egress window, Lot 7 Blk 19 Washburn's Addn, carried. J. Hollingsworth inquired about how to handle a project that was already completed without obtaining a permit. Johnson will send a request to fill out the permit and pay any fees due.

bids for removal, carried Committee Reports: Harris reported a new quote was received for insulating the City Shop, this one significantly lower than was previously guoted. Discussed options for funding the improvement which will include money from several departments. Harris moved, D. Hollingsworth second to approve insulation of the shop as guoted, carried. Kelly brought up the remaining water meters to be replaced. Attorney Kelly will draft a letter to send to residents including a statement that service could be disrupted if meters are not replaced. J. Hollingsworth moved, Day second to send the letter to anyone who needs a new meter still, carried. Kelly also expressed thanks to the police officers for helping to cover public works duties during our staffing shortage. Recycling service was discussed, the cost to recycle items is higher than regular trash services and it puts more mileage and wear and tear on the truck driving to Wahpeton. The amount of recycling picked up has steadily declined over the years and alternative options were discussed. Cardboard dumpsters will still be available around town. Harris moved, Day second to discontinue recycling pickup by the City, carried. The sanitation portfolio will discuss the plan for ending services and what to do with the totes. plan will be discussed at the next meeting. J. Hollingsworth has spoken with Thein Well about servicing the two wells, they are estimating \$15,000 for each well. Recently were informed that Rural Water will test hydrants for free, will pursue this going forward. A question was raised whether we could require alcohol establishments to have an electronic ID scanner for age verification. Several establishments recently obtained scanners and the Department of Health offers grants to assist with the purchases. Attorney Kelly will review ordinance and law and provide

The Commission proceeded to complete the determination of the particular lots and parcels of land within Street Improvement District No. 2023-01 especially benefitted, and the assessment of benefits against each such parcel of land.

WHEREAS, said Commission has caused to be made a complete list of the benefits and assessments setting forth each lot or improvement, and the amount assessed against each such lot or tract of land; and

WHEREAS, said list has been completed and there has been attached to said list of assessments a certificate. signed by all members of the Special Assessment Commission, certifying that the same is a true and correct assessment of the property therein described, to the best of their judgment, and stating the several items of expense included in the assessment; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT

**RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:** 

The Special Assessment

Commission has determined the particular lots and parcels of land which in the opinion of the Commission will be especially benefitted by the construction of such work for which such specia

assessments are to be made. The Special Assessment Commission has assessed against each such parcel of land such sum not exceeding the benefits as shall be necessary to pay its just proportion of the costs of such work, including all expenses incurred in the making of special assessments and publishing necessary notices with reference there

to and the per diem of the Commission.

3. The Commission has caused to be made a complete list of the benefits and assessments setting forth each lot or tract of land assessed, the amount each lot or tract is benefitted by the improvement, and the amount assessed against each such lot or tract of land; that each of said lots or tracts of land is hereby assessed the amount shown on said assessment list.
