The use of Fireworks is prohibited when the fire index rating is High, Very High or Extreme or a "Red Flad Warning" has been issued. Be it also required that any controlled burn occurring with the limits of Pi-erce County be reported to the Law Enforcement Center. These burn restrictions are in effect for Pierce County, but do not apply to the in-corporated cities of Balta, Rugby or Wolford.
