• Wear a hat with a wide brim to protect your face, neck and ears from sun rays. Wear dark hats with tightly woven fabric for the best protection. If wearing a baseball cap, ensure your ears and neck are protected by following the other recommendations.

Best Practices for Sun-

- Apply about 1 ounce of sunscreen 15 minutes before sun exposure. For reference, 1 ounce of sunscreen is enough to fill a shot glass or pocket-sized hand sanitizer bottle.
- Ask for assistance for hard-to-reach areas.
- Reapply sunscreen ev-

- Monitor the expiration date. Properly stored sunscreen has a shelf life of up to three years. After three years, discard unused sunscreen.
- · Exposure to high temperatures decreases the shelf life of sunscreen. Store sunscreen away from the sun in bags, wrapped in towels or in the shade.
- Don't forget frequently missed spots such as the ears, nose, lips, back of the neck, hands, tops of feet, hairline and exposed scalp.
- Use lip balm with SPF on

in Carpenter Township to deter-

mine the kind of culvert to get. Discussed Co Rd 6 and Co Rd 20 and the culverts on this road. Both will need to be upgraded/replaced. Arch pipe and one high, along with one lower metal culvert pros and cons were talked about with each kind. Co Rd 6 will get a small arch pipe, and Co Rd 20 will get a round pipe. Mike will get the bid forms ready and send them out.

Casey Olson came in to discuss the three building permits. Commissioner Grandalen motioned to approve the permits, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Commissioner Brown discussed the letter from the City of Hope regarding renewing the Renaissance zone. The city is looking for support. Commissioner Strand motioned to write a letter of support, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Flaten discussed the elections and running other tax districts' elections. It was discussed that the county will no longer run the school districts as they hold elections yearly, and we were currently only running one school district out of 7. It would also need multiple different ballot styles.

Flaten talked about the 2026 budget and will get them out to all the departments and would like them back by May 14th, 2026.

Gates discussed the new ambulance districts and the meeting on April 7th. He will report back at the next commissioner meeting.

Sheriff Beckman discussed the 100-year celebration for the courthouse next summer and asked if he could add a budget line for this celebration. A committee will be formed to plan and discuss the

The commissioners discussed the waterboard and ongoing concerns regarding a few drains. Bown has been attending meetings, discussing with the waterboard, and

waiting for their next step. The commissioners discussed that they would work with the waterboard and get things correct, as the waterboard sees fit.

Public Health Administrator Hannah Zamora joined the meeting to discuss the grant funding and some of the funding the Public Health office is losing. She is looking at about \$50,000.00 in grant funding that she will lose. This was not planned; it was brought to her and the rest of the public health offices throughout the state early this month. She will continue to work on billing insurance, as she does get funding back through them, but it does take time to see that funding gets back to the county. This was previously not done in the past few years, so that will be a nice income after losing some grant funding. Other than the loss of grant funding, things are going well in her office.
