# Tick season arrives: Stay safe while enjoying the outdoors

With summer almost officially here, many of us are heading outdoors to take in the fresh air, sunshine, and all that nature has to offer. But with the change in season comes a growing concern—ticks. These tiny pests are more than just a nuisance, and this year they seem to be more common in our region than in years past.

Ticks prefer shady, moist environments and are often found close to the ground. They typically cling to tall grass and low shrubs, lying in wait for a passing host. Around homes, they're commonly found in lawns, gardens, and along the edges of tree belts.

The most commonly encountered species are the American dog tick, the Rocky Mountain wood tick, and the blacklegged tick, also known as the deer tick. These species are known carriers of bacterial diseases such as tularemia, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, and Lyme disease.

A tick bite often appears as a small, painless red bump. If you discover a tick attached to your skin, it should be removed carefully by using tweezers or tissue to grasp it

as close to the skin as possible. It's important to pull upward with steady, even pressure without crushing the tick. After removal, the area of the bite and your hands should be washed thoroughly with soap and water.

Symptoms of tick-borne illnesses may take several weeks to appear. These symptoms can include fever, chills, headaches, muscle or joint pain, rashes (either around the bite or on other parts of the body such as the arms or legs), and swollen lymph nodes. If you notice any of these symptoms, it's important to contact your doctor promptly and mention any recent tick bites or outdoor activity.

To help prevent tick-borne illness, people should take precautions when spending time outdoors. Wearing insect repellent with DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 can help protect exposed skin. Clothing treated with permethrin offers additional protection. After spending time outside, especially in wooded or grassy areas, it's important to thoroughly check your body for ticks. Parents should carefully inspect children, particularly in areas such as behind the knees, under the arms, around the waist, inside the ears and belly button, and in the scalp. Pets should also be checked regularly and treated with appropriate tick pre-



vention methods, as ticks can easily hitch a ride into your home on furry companions.

With some awareness and simple precautions, you can protect yourself and your family from tick bites and continue to enjoy all the outdoor experiences that summer has to offer.

The Steele County Commission meeting was called to order at 8:15 a.m. Commissioners Perry Brown, Brandon Krueger, Richard Strand, Brandon Oxton, and Chris Grandalen were present. Auditor Jana Flaten and DES manager Ben Gates were also present.

Commissioner Krueger motioned to approve the April minutes, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

There is one addition to today's agenda- Co Rd 10 ditch.

The Steele County Park Board meeting began at 8:16 am.

The Steele County Commissioner Meeting reconvened at 8:22 am.
Gates discussed the Jacobson Lawn care quote and said that if we let them know if it is approved, they could mow today. Commissioner Strand motioned

to approve the Jacobson Lawn care quote, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

The commissioners discussed the option for the current lawn mower: should sealed bids be accepted or an auction? Also mentioned that Northwood Lawn spraying would not be needed, as it is on the Jacobson Quote.

Gates and Ben Bassingthwaite (Interstate Engineering) discussed graveling; about 33.5 miles will be done, and they want to get bid paperwork out. They will award the bid in June. An incentive date will be in early August to complete the gravel jobs. Commissioner Brown motioned to have Mike get the bid packet together and send it out, seconded by Commissioner Krueger. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Gates talked about the summer help. One guy started yesterday, and two more will begin on May 19th. The road crew is working extra hours to seal cracks during the nice weather. There have been no qualified blade operator applications.

Gates asked the commissioner to reimburse Kyle's cell phone. Commissioner Strand motioned to approve Kyle's cell phone reimbursement, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Gates also discussed the Burn ban/Fire declaration and would like the commissioners to adopt/approve this. Commissioner Strand motioned to approve the fire declaration, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Flaten discussed the abatements that Casey Olson had for the commissioners to approve. Commissioner Krueger motioned to approve the abatements, seconded by Commissioner Brown. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried

Flaten discussed new hours for the courthouse. It was discussed to reduce lunch to a half-hour instead of one hour and to get rid of summer hours and have regular hours throughout the year. She proposed Monday through Thursday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 1 p.m., with no lunch. This would be a total of 37 hours a week instead of 37.5 hours. Flaten talked with all employees and received positive reviews from everyone. Commissioner Strand motioned to approve the new courthouse hours starting on May 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025, seconded by Commissioner Grandalen. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. Dennis Kubischta asked the commissioners to sign a 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary proclamation for the Steele County Vietnam Veterans. Awards will be given at the memorial services. Alike Bassingthwaite (Interstate Engineering) discussed the seal coating bids. Bids came in lower than normal, which is great. Fog coat was discussed, and we can use Prairie Dog funding to fund it. The pros and cons were then discussed. This can be added when they do the chip sealing this sum-

mer.
Discussions were held about the Fugleberg drain. The commissioners have decided to go with the recommendation of the water board. Discussions about the water drainage and the culvert are getting worse and will need to be replaced by the county.

Sheriff Beckman asked the commissioners to pay Sady for her work done in the sheriff's office, now that she is the treasurer, but

she has been taking on more duties in the sheriff's office. He is asking for \$3,600.00 to be added to her salary for her office work. Commissioner Strand motioned to approve the added salary, which Commissioner Grandalen seconded. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Megan Vig called the Steele County Weed Board to order at 9:15 am. Discussing the noxious weeds and reviewing the Steele County list, it was decided to add water hemp to the list. Commissioner Grandalen motioned to add water hemp to the noxious weed list, seconded by Commissioner Krueger. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Commissioner Strand motioned to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Commissioner Oxton. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

The Weed board adjourned at 9:20 am.

The Steele County Water Board gave an update on ongoing projects. Elm River Dam is great and asked Townships for updates. A discussion was held about beaver dam permits, drain tile and all FEMA projects are wrapping up. They also gave an update on the Fugleberg drain and Hanson Drain. Commissioner Brown motioned

to approve the bills, seconded by Commissioner Strand. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.

Commissioner Strand moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Commissioner Krueger. There was no further discussion, and all members voted aye. The motion carried.
