Sheridan County's fishing waters have gotten a good share of fish stocked in 1999; it was reported in the April-May issue of North Dakota Outdoors. Some prairie lakes are being developed as fisheries for the first time, having enough depth to support fish. Among them is Wolf Lake, southwest of Martin. Wolf Lake was stocked with 821 adult yellow perch.

Coal Mine Lake, located within the Lonetree Wildlife Management area, was stocked with 3,239 yellow perch.

The northern pike is very well suited to prairie lakes. Stocking figures in Sheridan County were 16,000 in Coal Mine Lake, and 156,571 were released into the McClusky Canal chain of lakes. The McClusky Canal lakes were also stocked with 1,900 tiger muskies.

## HAY AUCTION

The Garrison Diversion Conservancy District will be offering approximately 1,634.3 acres of hayland on the McClusky Canal to the highest bidder during a competitive open bid auction to be held at 10 a.m. on June 10, 2025. The bid auction site is the McClusky District Field Office located 3 miles west of McClusky, North Dakota immediately south of Highway 200. Thirty-one individual fields will be bid and hayed separately. Actual figures are subject to change before the bid date.

No haying will be permitted before July 15 or after August 15 and the bales must be removed by October 15. Payment must be received at the date of auction. A taxpayer ID or Driver's License # is required. Bids will be accepted on a per site basis. Minimum bid price is set at \$10 per site and minimum raise of \$50 per site. the nation held its breath in anticipation of a Supreme Court decision in US v. Nixon, on the question of whether Nixon was required to turn over the "Watergate Tapes, and whether Nixon, who had asserted an absolute executive privilege to withhold documents, the release of which would doom his presidency. In 1952, The Supreme Court, in the Steel Seizure Case, ruled against President Harry Truman's assertion of authority, in the face of a nationwide steel strike, to seize the steel industry to keep it open and operating to support the Kore-

an War and the Marshall Plan. We should assume that President Trump, like his predecessors who pressed executive authority, will comply with court orders to retrieve Garcia from a notorious Salvadoran penal colony, to which his administration mistakenly deported him. The lesson is clear, as the Court held in Cooper v. Aaron (1958): "The federal judiciary is supreme in the exposition of the law of the Constitution."
