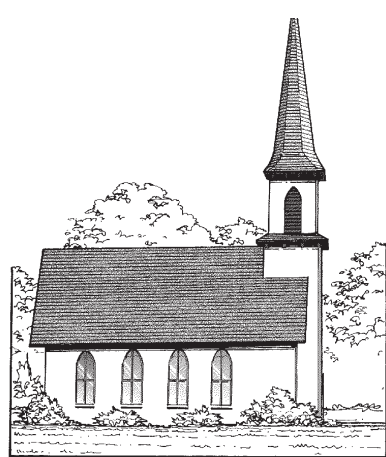

# Safety For Both Motorist and Farm Equipment Operators

In 2023, the North Dakota Department of Transportation reported that nearly 22% of crashes that involved farm equipment on public roads occurred in the month of May – the month with the highest report of farm equipment crashes with automobiles. In addition, 68% of crashes with farm equipment occurred primarily on asphalt roads. Often, the difference in speed between vehicles and farm equipment causes farm equipment collisions. Motorists approach the slow-moving farm equipment at high speeds, only having a few seconds to identify the hazard and react, which typically results in a crash.

Sharing the road with farm equipment operators can be done successfully. However, a team effort is required by both farm equipment operators and general motorists to ensure that defensive driving skills are in place at all times and that distracted driving, especially from cell phone use, is eliminated.

- Be prepared to slow down when you see flashing hazard lights and a slow-moving vehicle sign, as this may indicate that you are approaching a tractor with farm machinery. When you see this sign, slow down and stay back at least 50 feet from the machine. Most tractors are not designed to travel at speeds greater than 25 to 30 mph.
- Never assume that it is safe to pass farm equipment. Farm equipment operators may drive from field approach to field approach, making wide turns at unexpected intersections. Think ahead by looking for possible driveways or field approaches that the equipment operator may turn into.
- Passing is risky. Even if the equipment operator seems to be pulling over to allow you to pass, consider other dangers of the situation, such as oncoming traffic you may not be able to see and protruding equipment pieces, such as the folded shanks of tillage equipment. Remember to watch for approaches, as the equipment operator may be preparing to make a turn if you see them starting to pull over.
- Be alert for when the equipment may make a turn. Because farm equipment is so large, making turns can be challenging. When making left turns, farm machine operators will "swing" their equipment far out to the right side of the road before making a left turn. Slow down and do not assume it is safe to pass. Allow the machine operator to complete the turn, as they may have restricted rear visibility and not know you were approaching directly behind them.

To ensure road safety with farm equipment, you should:

- Verify that all lights and flashers on your farm vehicle are working properly.
- Be mindful of the height of your farm equipment and avoid power lines, low bridges and other overhead obstacles.
- Know roads and when to travel them.
- Communicate with fellow motorists.
- Use a slow-moving vehicle sign.
- Don't tow more implements than what's allowed.
- Follow the three-car rule.
- Ensure that any implement you are towing is visible.
- Know the rules about reflectors and flashing lights.

The responsibility of safely sharing the road during spring planting season falls on both farm equipment operators and general motorists.

in the nation enrolled in a federal program allowing the hospital to receive cost-based reimbursement to operate an ambulance.

During National Hospital Week, JMHCC will celebrate that “Symphony of Care.”

“At Jacobson Memorial Hospital, we provide a high-quality symphony of care, where it is our job to create as much harmony to support each individual person as possible,” says DNP Trevor Stavig.

“At JMHCC, we have the ability to treat multiple conditions with multiple modalities of services. We offer physical therapy, mental health support, ER services, hospital services, long-term care, walk-in services and primary care you can trust. We have the ability to refer to other services that are not provided at most community hospitals. We also have a visiting specialty to continue the wrap-around care to lessen the drive time for our patients,” he says.

The role of a critical access hospital is to provide health care services to rural, often underserved communities.

“I believe care starts when a patient makes an appointment and is greeted by a friendly front-end staff. It is followed by a friendly nurse who will care about the reason for your visit today. The next step is meeting with a well-trained and knowledgeable health care provider, who will take time with you and get to know not only the reason for your visit, but how it impacts your life. At JMHCC, we have up-to-date electronic health records, patient monitoring systems and communication platforms that can create a ‘digital symphony,’ where critical information is shared

in real-time, enabling timely and accurate care,” Stavig says.

Current providers include Stavig, who is primarily in Elgin, Rhonda Schmidt at the Glen Ullin Family Medical Clinic and Jolene Engelhart at the Richardton Clinic. Maria Aune rotates throughout all three clinics. Morris Duffy sees patients in Elgin and also provides emergency care, along with Deb Middleton, and the newest provider, Jurgen Weber.

JMHCC also has a financial impact on the community. Determined by the Center for Rural Health, JMHCC has a \$5.2 million direct and secondary impact.

# Schlatter - Coots break school record at the Pankratz Meet

The Glen Ullin/Hebron Bearcats Track and Field team made history this week at the Pankratz Meet in Dickinson, with two athletes shattering school records in a remarkable display of talent and determination.

Afton Coots broke the Bearcat Pole Vault record, clearing an impressive height of 8'3", while also achieving personal records in both the 100-meter dash and long jump. The standout performer placed fourth overall in the pole vault competition, continuing to show impressive growth in multiple events this season.

Not to be outdone, Danica Schlatter set a new Bearcat mile record with a time of 6:12.31. Finishing sixth in the 1600-meter event, Schlatter's time was fast enough to etch her name in the school's record books, demonstrating that personal achievement sometimes matters more than placement.

The Bearcats showed strength across multiple events at the meet. Marouchka Sako dominated the

throwing events, taking first place in shot put and second in discus. Tahj Thomas contributed with strong performances, placing 7th in the 100-meter dash, 8th in long jump,

and 5th in triple jump.

On the boys' side, Ryan Schneider placed 3rd in javelin and 5th in long jump, while Jaxon Rolle secured 2nd place in the 800-meter race. Calaghan Hauser finished 6th in pole vault, and Xavier Torres placed 8th in the 3200-meter run. The 4x800 relay team of Riley Schneider, Reid Schneider, Jacoby Elmer, and Jaxon Rolle took 5th place, while Uriyah Dakken placed 4th in JV 110 hurdles.

Coach Hauser said, “Breaking school records and qualifying for state in events takes exceptional dedication and talent. What Afton and Danica accomplished this week demonstrates the high level our program has reached and aims for. We are equally proud of all our athletes who placed or achieved personal bests, showing that our program continues to grow stronger across all events.”

The Bearcats look to build on these strong performances as they continue their season with growing confidence and momentum.
