Hides Whisky in a Manure Pile

Richard Nagel was born in 1916, 12 miles from Little Falls, Minnesota, home of Charles Lindbergh, who in 1927 flew solo across the Atlantic and became famous. Richard remembers the aviator driving his motorcycle down the street, gunning it.

Richard thinks it was in the fall of 1928 when his father brought the family to the Beach area. “He thought this was God’s country. God kind of fooled him when the ’30s came along. My dad had 10 of us in the family, and in those ’30s he had a hard time feeding us. He made whiskey [during Prohibition]; sold that. At that time most farmers threw the manure out of the door ’til spring when you would haul it away. But he would take a 30-gallon barrel and fill it with whiskey, raw whiskey, put it in there and cover it with manure. Anyway these revenue agents came out, and they could smell it but they couldn’t find it and there was a hay mound at that time. Some of the hay mounds came down right to the ground, and they literally moved the hay from one side to the other looking for it. If they would have stuck the fork into the manure pile, they would have hit the barrel.”

Richard married Leona Kippley in 1939. They worked for her father, who sold the farm to them in 1956. “He said they would make it so I could handle [the payment]. And he didn’t charge interest.” Leona died in 2013, just short of the Nagel’s 74th anniversary. “You couldn’t have had a better wife,” he says.

“The good Lord was good to us, too.” When asked about advice to his grandchildren, Richard says, “I think probably the first thing would be to be honest with people. That would be one big thing. And to thank people who do something for you. The things we do a lot of the times are what the good Lord is helping us or someone else is. I know we make mistakes. We all make mistakes. I’m 96 years old, and every once in a while I learn something.”

Germans from Russia Heritage Collection

The Northwest Blade, Eureka, S.D., published a wonderful story in August 2020, “Granddaughter keeps Grandmother’s precious chamomile seeds,” by Cindy Schumacher. Cindy wrote about the experiences of Judy Hooff. Judy grew up in Eureka, founded in 1887, once called the “Breadbasket of the World” for its many wheat elevators and the trains that transported the grain to the rest of the country.

When she was a first grader, Judy Hooff lived with her grandparents, Christian and Christina (Neuharth) Opp and Gottfried and Eva Helfenstein. She recalled her Grandma Opp introduced her to chamomile tea, which she grew in her garden. She picked the flowers, dried them in newspapers and stored the chamomile in mason jars.

“Grandma thought that chamomile tea was the cure-all for just about anything that ailed me,” said Hooff, “Tea compresses were applied to my eyes if I had pinkeye, or she used a tea if I had a tummy ache. I’ve been told women had sewn chamomile and vermouth seeds into the hems of their dresses before their departure. I’m fairly certain the seeds would have been confiscated upon their arrival to America,” Hooff explains.

Cindy Schumacher continues to write, “Hooff said she felt strongly about preserving her grandmother’s tea, which was the same strain of chamomile her ancestors brought with them from Germany and Russia when they immigrated to America. On a visit to Eureka 40 years after moving away, Hooff found chamomile flowers growing where her grandparents’ house had been. Even though most of the farms she remembered as a child are gone, she found chamomile still thriving around the foundation.”

“Chamomile was everywhere, and these seeds were from my grandmother’s garden. I was determined to bring chamomile back to Portland. I tried planting it in my garden but was unsuccessful due to the moist north-western climate,” Hooff remarked.

In 1998, Russia made chamomile the official flower. The flower is an adorable little bloom with snow white petals and bright yellow center. It is
