

Bearcat Junior High Track Team ‘excelled’

The Glen Ullin/Hebron Junior High track team enjoyed a day of remarkable achievements under sunny skies Monday, April 28 in Beach, where personal growth and team spirit took center stage.

The meet proved to be a breakthrough event for the young athletes, with an astonishing number of personal records (PRs) set across various events. Nearly every competitor achieved at least one PR, demonstrating the impressive development happening within the program.

“The kids worked hard and had fun,” noted Coach Sara Hauser. “We learned some valuable lessons along the way.”

The girls’ 4×800 relay team of Morgan Coots, Alia Glasser, KiAnna Staiger, and Aleena Torres captured second place, showcasing both talent and teamwork in one of the day’s highlight performances. Multiple athletes demonstrated exceptional versatility, including Cambri Staiger who set personal records in the 100M, shot put, and long jump.

Among the boys, Gabe O’Donnell led the way with a fourth-place finish in the 800M while also recording personal bests in the 1600M and long jump. The boys’ 4×100 relay

team of Kerry Sako, Eli Foss, Oliver Tutorow, and Gabe O’Donnell also achieved a collective personal record.

What stood out most was the team’s supportive atmosphere. “We learned to celebrate our own accomplishments as well as our teammates,” the coach emphasized, highlighting the positive culture developing among these young athletes.

Other standout performers included Morgan Coots, Peyton Cotant, and KiAnna Staiger, who each achieved personal records in three

different events, demonstrating impressive all-around athletic ability.

The day perfectly encapsulated the junior high track experience – a combination of personal achievement, team camaraderie, and valuable life lessons that extend well beyond the track.

With this impressive showing, the future looks promising for the Bearcats track program as these developing athletes continue to grow in both skill and character.

Beverly Rehm funeral will be held Monday, May 5 at Dillion, Montana

Beverly Marie Rehm passed to her heavenly home April 23, 2025. She was born April 10, 1940, in the prairie town of Hebron, ND to Buster and Doris Keith, the first of their six children.

Her grandmother owned the Green Lantern Café, and her parents owned the Columbia Hotel and Buster’s Bar in Hebron.

In the 8th grade she got her first job working concessions at the Mayer Theater. She later worked as a medical assistant at the local clinic.

She married local farm boy, Bill Rehm in 1959 upon his return from service in the US Army, after being stationed in German. She gave birth to daughter Brooke Ellen, January 1, 1960, at Saint Mary’s Cathedral Monastery in Richardton, ND.

She delighted in telling the story of the nuns excitedly delivering the New Year’s Baby. Two years later, she gave birth to son Brent Keith in Pendelton, OR.

Bill became a respected auctioneer and judge of purebred cattle and together they built Rehm Sale Service, having ownership in Beaverhead Livestock auction, as well.

Over the years, they acquired agricultural properties in Gallatin, Jefferson, and Beaverhead Counties. They were partners in business and in life.

In 1976 she decided to complete the college education she began at Dickinson State Teachers College, earning a degree in Elementary Education from Western Montana College. She was known by her younger classmates as a student who took her studies seriously and was a favorite among her professors.

Her home of over 50 years on the corner of Parkview Ct. and Walnut Street was a popular gathering place, especially on

She was deeply devoted to her late husband of 56 years, her children and grandchildren.

Her great grandchildren know that a visit to Grandma Bev’s resulted in a trip to the park, Dairy Queen, or Dollar Tree. She treasured her relationships with her First Presbyterian Church Community, bridge partners, coffee buddies, walking partners, and her beloved sister-in-law, Betty Rehm.

She is survived by daughter Brooke (Cal) Erb, and son Brent (Mary) Rehm; grandchildren Bethany Erb Collin (Chelsea) Erb, Brynn (Jordan) Lee, Brandon Rehm and Morgan Rehm; great grandchildren Grace O’Donovan, Bryleigh Erb, Chayse Erb, Colsea Erb, Holden Lee, Lorelei Lee, and Lilith Lee; siblings Sharon Hehn, Bruce Keith, Kelly Keith, and Kerry Gietzen.

She was preceded in death by her husband, her parents, and brother, Neal Keith.
