75 Years Ago

Golden Valley News, April 27, 1950: Coming entirely unexpectedly was the death of Mrs. Joe Dietz of rural Sentinel Butte, who succumbed six hours after her infant son was born at St. Joseph Hospital in Dickinson. Infant son Thomas passed away later that evening. Survivors include her husband and 12 children. Mrs. Dietz, the former Grace Marie Wassman, was born at Sentinel Butte in 1912, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Wassman. Notice: Sealed bids for materials for the construction of a fire hall in Golva, ND. Inquire with the village clerk, Genevieve Schrom. Uninvited student crashes through the storm and regular window at Beach High, scattering glass. The rooster pheasant was DOA! Golden Valley News, May 1, 1975: Nancy Uecker, 41, wife of Hettinger cattle buyer Ted Uecker, drowned last Thursday in a swimming mishap at Acapulco, Mexico. Mr. Uecker is well-known here, having served as American Legion baseball coach in Beach and as an official at various athletic events in the area. Ivan Nicholson of the Bismarck office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was in Beach last Wednesday to assist in the investigation of recent break-ins in Beach. At least five local homes were entered the night of April 18. Letter to the Editor: I am enclosing a check for \$5.50 for another years subscription to the G.V. News. I started my subscription to the Beach paper back in May 1908, when I came to Beach and bought a half section of land in the Burkey area. Golden Valley News, May 4, 2000: There is nothing left of a toilet destroyed by a pipe bomb planted in the southeast boys bathroom at Beach High School on Friday, April 28th. The door was blown off the stall and pieces of porcelain blown about the room. Superintendent Charles Soper and Principal Brandt Gaugler were away from the premises during the 11:20 a.m. explosion.
