Nine DPS students inducted to Honor Society

In a ceremony held at Hastings Landing Sunday evening, April 27, eight Drayton Public High School students were inducted into the National Honor Society (NHS) and one DPS junior high student was inducted into the National Junior Honor Society (NJHS).

The ceremony was called to order with the strike of a gavel by Chapter President Daniel De Souza and after a short welcome, he introduced Alyssa Hoyles as the newly elected National Honor Society President. She came forward to begin the candle lighting ceremony.

Hoyles sited February 25, 2011 as the date the Honor Society became active in Drayton. The goal of the National Honor Society is to grow and empower students to become well rounded graduates in the areas of Scholarship, Service, Leadership, Character, and Citizenship.

Current members and the evening's inductees took to the podium one by one to explain the five pillars of what the NHC supports.

Scholarship

Violet Hoyles was the first to describe everyday scholarship. "A student is willing to spend hours in reading and study, knowing the lasting benefits of a cultivated mind," Hoyles explained. Easton Larson said "We should continue to learn even when formal education has ended, for human education ends only with the end of life."

Service

Peyton Larson spoke on the topic of service. "Service can be established in the routine of the day's work where many opportunities arise to help others both at school and in the community," she told the crowd. Later in the ceremony Rylee Maurstad describes service as "a willingness to work for the benefit of those in need without monetary compensation or public recognition."

Leadership

Jonah Rarick was the first to speak about Leadership. According to Rarick, "Taking initiative in the classroom and in school activities, the real leader strives to train and aid others to reach their common goals of success." He closed with "Leadership is always needed; thus, to lead is a meaningful and substantive charge to each of our members." Also speaking of leadership, Taylor Hermanson said a leader "should exert a wholesome influence on the school."

Character

The fourth characteristic, character, was addressed first by Melissa De Souza. She said "It [character]

is that without which no one can respect oneself, nor hope to attain the respect of others." Alyvia Quibell added "Character is achieved and not received."

Citizenship

"The responsibilities each of us has to our home community, our state, our nation and our world are many. As good citizens, we are bound to live up to the laws and guidelines, which unite us as a civilized society," is what Reegan Aasand said about the group's charge to be upstanding citizens.

Each new member stepped forward individually to receive a membership certificate, a flower and to place their signature into the registry as a lifetime inductee into the NHS or NJHS.


