## **North Dakota Outdoors: Poaching is stealing from hunters**

Even if you've never been a hunter, you're likely familiar with the term poaching. Poaching is theft, plain and simple. It's the illegal taking or killing of fish and wildlife. It's stealing from legal hunters and trampling on the public trust. It might be shooting before legal hours, fishing without a license or shooting an extra deer, duck or pheasant.

The first few issues of poaching I witnessed in my time as a game warden are etched in memory. Coming around the corner and seeing a man in a creek spearing pike running upstream. Watching a hunting party shoot a deer and leave them until

another hunter with the proper tag arrived.

Both incidents were blatant violations and not excused by "it was an accident" or "I didn't know."

While some give a shade of acceptance to "they were going to eat it all." In this day and age of public assistance, poaching extra game and fish isn't the way to solve hunger.

I'll ask you. Have you ever been with someone poaching or witnessed an illegal act of a hunter or angler?

I should note many, including myself, divide the word. When a hunter or angler commits an unlawful act, they no longer earn the respect of the term. The minute an illegal act is taken, they become a poacher.

When you witness a wildlife violation, don't just complain about it - report it. And do so immediately. Not later standing in line at the convenience store.

North Dakota employs just a few dozen field game wardens, each covering nearly 3,000 square miles. Within that is terrain from badlands and river valleys to wide open, sparsely populated regions and some hardto-get-to places, even in this age of advances in mobility and UTVs.

Hunters and citizens are the extra

set of eyes and ears in the field. That's where the Report All Poachers program, launched in 1983, becomes vital: anonymous tips, monetary rewards, and collaboration between North Dakota Game and Fish, State Radio and North Dakota Wildlife Federation.

#### **How it works:**

- Call 701-328-9921.
- Provide clear, timely details of what happened, exactly where, descriptions of the violator(s), their vehicle, license plate, who
- was doing what, and so on. Stay safe. Never try to stop the violator or confront them yourself. Leave the enforcement to
- trained wardens. Remain anonymous if you prefer. Reward amounts range from \$100 to \$1,000 depending on the severity of the crime.

## Why report now?

Complaints at the local filling station or waiting until the next wildlife club meeting or the next time you run into a warden does little, at best. Game warden intervention is only possible if poaching events are reported promptly. Wardens can often arrive before suspects leave the scene if notified immediately. Maybe a game warden is just a few miles away?

## City Council Meeting

**October 6, 2025** City Office at 7pm BEING PUBLISHED SUBJECT TO THE GOVERNING BODY'S REVIEW AND REVISION Mayor Olson called the meeting to order at 7pm. Council Members present were Larson, Grundstrom, Weimer, T. Van Camp, Nelson and Halcrow. City employees present were DeGeldere, Mattice and Misialek. Mayor Olson opened up the public comments section to the one resident that completed a speaker card, which was Kristi Quibell. Ms. Quibell brought her questions regarding the Infrastructure Project and upcoming special vote regarding a new 2% sales and use tax to be used for the project and maintenance. Dylan Ensrude from Moore Engineering shared changes in funding and in the project that have occurred since the Public Information Meeting that was held in January. Mr. Ensrude assured Ms. Quibell that at least one public information meeting will be held prior to the special vote. The date for that meeting will be November 18, 2025 at 7pm at the Johnson Hall Community Center. Mayor Olson moved on from the Public Comment Period to Mr. Ensrude who presented the updated timeline of actions that need to be addressed including the four resolutions that need to be approved tonight. These are: 1. Resolution Directing Engineer to Prepare Report 2. Resolution Approving Engineer's Report 3. Resolution Creating Improvement District NO. 2025-1 -Sewer, Water, and Street Improvements of the City of Drayton, North Dakota 4. Resolution Declaring Work Necessary for an Improvement in Sewer, Water and Street Improvement District NO. 2025-1 Motion was made by Larson, seconded by Grundstrom, all in favor of approving all four resolutions. The Special Election Vote to implement a new 2% sales and use tax will be held on Tuesday, December 16, 2025 at the City Office from 7am to 9pm. Notice of Election \$2,555.00; ND Sewage Pump and sample of the ballot language will be published on October 9 & 16, 2025 in Valley News and Views. An email sent by BNSF was discussed. They wanted the City of Drayton to pay \$51,200 toward a surface replacement project on West Grant. The council was all in agreement that this is a BNSF project and there is no need for the City of Drayton to contribute to their project. Chief Mattice presented his September report of calls and

ND Sewage Pump for replacing the gate valves and the check valves on the main lift station. These valves are about 20 year old and getting to the point where they are not going to open or close. The quoted amount to remove and install is \$17,610. Motion to approve having this work done was made by Grundstrom, seconded by T. Van Camp, all in favor. DeGeldere also presented the quote from Rock's Electric regarding installing automatic transfer switches in two lift stations and wiring four auto starts for generators totaling \$25,190.00 and the second quote from Rock's Electric regarding rotating the control panels on two of the lift stations at a cost of \$8500.00 each. DeGeldere was asked to get quotes from another electrician also. DeGeldere updated the council that the line to the water plant has now been capped. Next steps need to be determined on dismantling the water plant. He will check with the state on what those steps might be and then get a cost. Misialek presented an event permit for Purse Bingo on Oct 25, 2025. Motion to approve this permit was made by T. Van Camp, seconded by Grundstrom, all in favor. Misialek presented a quote from Indigo Signs to repair the digital sign in the amount of \$2150-\$2350. Motion was made by Grundstrom, seconded by Weimer, all in favor to repair the sign. Two properties have been bought and demolished by Kevin Pierce. A motion was made by Grundstrom, seconded by Larson, that once construction begins on one of the properties, the city will forgive any past utility bills owed, with Grundstrom, Larson, T. Van Camp, Nelson and Halcrow voting yes, Weimer voting no. Motion passed. Motion to approve September minutes was made by T. Van Camp, seconded by Weimer, all in favor. Vendor Bills:
