Patti was born September 3, 1954 and was raised in Williston, ND where she attended St. Joseph Catholic School for eight years and went on to graduate from Williston High School in 1972.

Patti loved the farm life. She loved cows and horses and would

be outside all day if she could. She met the love of her life Mike Herring while she was attending Veterinary Technology School in Thermopolis, WY. She started her first job as a vet technician in Dayton. She and Mike started their story at the Padlock ranch in Sheriden, living amongst other cowboys and girls on the mountain caring for cows. She and Mike were married at St. Joseph’s Catholic Church on September 3, 1977. On May 24, 1981, they welcomed their first daughter Jaci.

In January of 1982, they moved to the arm-pit of the Oklahoma pan-handle for Mike to start working for Northern Natural Gas company. In this beautiful red dirt country, they welcomed their second daughter Tina on October 2, 1982. Patti continued to work with animals at the vet clinic in Shattuck. While raising their kids in Oklahoma, they raised their girls to love softball, basketball, camping at the lake, and horse races. Patti and Mike never missed a game as both the biggest cheerleaders and strictest coaches for not only their girls but the children of their friends. Surrounded by her Okie “family”, Patti

and her friends loved going to rodeos, dances, and craft shows.

On May 22, 1995, the Herrings moved back to Patti’s homeland amongst the Breaks of North Dakota to be closer to family. Pat worked at the Western Vet Clinic. Going home to her little slice of heaven with Mike provided the rest she needed to get up and run another day.

Patti also loved to sew and would make all the girls’ holiday dresses and any other special occasion outfits that they needed. As time went on, she began quilting. What started out as one quilting retreat a year quickly became two or three. She would stop at any fabric store she spotted. She enjoyed this time because she got to spend

time with her sisters and sisters-in-laws.
