coming out on top. North Pole News: C.S., Arvid and Guy schools had a spelling match with Ruth Edwards taking first prize and Ruth Trollope 2nd. Camel cigarettes 20¢, The Butte Drug & Jewelry Co., Sentinel Butte.

75 Years Ago

Golden Valley News, April 27, 1950: Coming entirely unexpectedly was the death of Mrs. Joe Dietz of rural Sentinel Butte, who succumbed six hours after her infant son was born at St. Joseph Hospital in Dickinson. Infant son Thomas passed away later that evening. Survivors include her husband and 12 children. Mrs. Dietz, the former Grace Marie Wassman, was born at Sentinel Butte in 1912, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Wassman. Notice: Sealed bids for materials for the construction of a fire hall in Golva, ND. Inquire with the village clerk, Genevieve Schrom. Uninvited student crashes through the storm and regular window at Beach High, scattering glass. The rooster pheasant was DOA! 50 Years Ago

Golden Valley News, May 1, 1975: Nancy Uecker, 41, wife of Hettinger cattle buyer Ted Uecker, drowned last Thursday in a swimming mishap at Acapulco, Mexico. Mr. Uecker is well-known here, having served as American Legion baseball coach in Beach and as an official at various athletic events in the area. Ivan Nicholson of the Bismarck office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was in Beach last Wednesday to assist in the investigation of recent break-ins in Beach. At least five local homes were entered the night of April 18. Letter to the Editor: I am enclosing a check for \$5.50 for another years subscription to the G.V. News. I started my subscription to the Beach paper back in May 1908, when I came to Beach and bought a half section of land in the Burkey area. Golden Valley News, May 4, 2000: There is nothing left of a toilet destroyed by a pipe bomb planted in the southeast boys bathroom at Beach High School on Friday, April 28th. The door was blown off the stall and pieces of porcelain blown about the room. Superintendent Charles Soper and Principal Brandt Gaugler were away from the premises during the 11:20 a.m. explosion. School board members expressed their opinion that the school should have been evacuated immediately after the explosion until a thorough search of the entire facility had been conducted, instead of the students being released at the end of the school day at 3:15 p.m. Beach area bowling leagues have finished up the 1999-2000 winter leagues with potluck supper and moonlight bowling. Linda May Ridenhower, 78 of Beach. ND passed away April 18, 2025 at her home surrounded by the love of her caring family. She was the proud matriarch of her family and was beloved by us all. Linda was a devout Christian throughout her entire life and the family is comforted to know that she has gone home to be with the Lord.

Funeral services for Linda were held on April 23, 2025, at 10 a.m. at Grace Church in Beach with Pastor Ben

Baker officiating. Visitation was held at Silha Funeral Home on Tuesday, April 22 from 6 to 8 p.m.

Linda May was born April 17, 1947, to Donald and Joyce (Snow) Metcalf in Beach. They lived in Trotters, ND. In 1950 the family was blessed by the birth of her brother, Ronald. Linda attended Divide School in Golden Valley County until Christmas of grade 6, when the school shut down and Linda and Ronald were transferred to school in Beach. The family moved to Beach in 1958, and she finished her schooling at Lincoln Elementary and then Beach High School, graduating in 1965. Linda also won the Homemaker of the Year award in 1965 with the Rainbow Girls Club, a title she lived up to her entire life for her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

On June 26, 1965, Linda married her sweetheart, Howard Ridenhower. Then, immediately a big move to Verndale, MN. The Minnesota years were busy tackling various jobs while working on farms. All four of their children were born while living in Minnesota. They raised pigs, Howard trained horses, there was a large

yard and garden to care for and plenty of horse shows to attend. In 1971, they bought a dairy farm, where they won the Premier Dairy Farmer award, earning top producer for three years.

In 1979 they sold the dairy farm, and the family made their return move to Beach. Howard began his career at West Plains Implement, while Linda was kept busy with her children, jobs at the Wibaux County Nursing Home and Golden Valley County dispatch. She of course was very active with the Women of Evangelical Church and the Golden Valley Community Cupboard. Linda had a large garden every year and was always cooking, sewing, fixing, moving and remodeling; absolutely anything that needed to be done. She was a talented painter and quilter. Her works of art are treasured by all those who had been gifted with a painting and later on, beautiful handmade quilts. Linda took great care while constructing the "This is Your Life" scrapbooks for each of her children. She meticulously saved newspaper clippings, report cards, pictures, and provided family background creating treasured keepsakes. Linda was a wonderful cook, baker and hostess. Countless large family gatherings were catered as a group effort by all the ladies in the family, but mostly everyone was after Linda's lefse and chocolate birthday cakes.

The 1990s brought more changes and adventures for Linda. By then all her kids were done with their schooling, and she was blessed by the births of her grandchildren. Linda was so proud of all eight of them, she had formed special and unique bonds with each of them. Oh, and more moving. In 1994, Howard and Linda move to Circle, MT then to Bowman/Scranton, ND in 1997, both times were to help establish another branch of West Plains Implement. Linda worked in the West Plains office while in Circle and then at Bowman County Elder Care. She and Howard made frequent trips back to Beach for visits with their parents.

In 2009, Howard retired, and they made their final move back home to Beach. They did some traveling, but mostly cared for their parents, hosted family gatherings and began assisting other

church leaders in the big project of a new church . . . Grace Church. Since Howard's passing in 2015, Linda has been blessed with eight great-grandchildren, which has filled her with even more love and joy.
