Elevated Manganese Levels in Water

This document outlines the timeline of events and actions taken by the Spirit Lake Tribe in response to elevated manganese levels detected in the community's water supply.

Timeline May 13, 2025: Initial water sample collected by Spirit Lake Water Treatment Plant indicating elevated manganese levels. May 20, 2025: Follow-up water sample collected confirming manganese levels exceed EPA health advisories.

May 27, 2025: Spirit Lake Tribal Council convenes an emergency meeting with Emergency Manager, Health Center Medical Staff, Water Resources Department, and Public Relations to discuss the elevated manganese (Mn) levels (1.23 mg/L) in drinking water. • Announcement to inform residents issued, highlighting the health risks Resources Department, to ensure community safety.

 Public Service Announcement (PSA) and press release disseminated via social media, email, and printed copies provided to elders.

May 28, 2025: First Incident Command Team Meeting held at 9 AM. The team includes leads from various tribal departments tasked with addressing the manganese contamination.

• Key roles assigned: Incident Commander, Alternate Incident Command, Public Information Officer, Water Orders and Donations Coordinator, Delivery and Restock Coordinator, Distribution Supervisor.

 Water distribution plan developed: bottled water to be distributed at one case per two people, with priority for families with infants, elders, and immunocompromised individuals.

Blue-green algae: Know it. Avoid it. Report it.

North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality reminds residents that hot weather and accumulated nutrients can lead to blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms in water bodies across the state. Blue-green algae can cause Harmful Algal Blooms, producing toxins in the water called cyanotoxins. Environmental Quality responds to reported blooms across the state and tests water for toxins. If toxins are at an unsafe level, Environmental Quality issues public advisories and warnings.

People that swallow or come into contact with water containing cyanotoxins can become sick with diarrhea and vomiting; or experience numb lips, tingling fingers and toes, dizziness, rashes, hives and skin blisters. Pets and livestock may also suffer adverse health effects, including death. There are no known antidotes for the cyanotoxins produced by blue-green algae. Children and pets are at a higher risk than adults for illness

> Know it. Blue-green algae can look like grass clippings floating in the water, clumps/puffballs or green cottage cheese. It can also make the water appear like spilled green paint or green pea soup.

If you or your pet accidentally swims in water that might have a cyanobacteria bloom, rinse off with fresh water as soon as possible.
