## 911 ADDRESSING:

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Survey questions and cost estimates will be discussed at the October meeting. Brosz Engineering will provide larger maps for commissioners to denote street intersections to allow for an estimate once they know the per sign cost for each and the costs to install said signage.

During an interview with the Adams County Record, Alison Vetter, Strategic Communications Chief at the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services in Bismarck, N.D., confirmed Adams County is considered a State Emergency Communications Center (SECC) formerly known as a State Radio County. This meaning the local 911 dispatching is done through Bismarck for those rural communi-

ties. They provide this service for counties that are too small to have 24/7 dispatch operators, or they fill in for parts of time a local operator is not available. She said currently they provide these services for 26 or 27 counties. This SECC status was looked into as a component of investigating how many counties in North Dakota do not have the 911 addressing completed, as set forth in North Dakota Century Code regulations.

Upon Adams County Record's further investigating with a member of Vetter's team, Phill Peterschick, Geographic Information System (GIS) Section Chief also at the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services, clarification was given that Adams County is one of four counties that doesn't

have the 911 address-  
ing that is called for in  
North Dakota Century  
Code 57-40.6-10. He said  
the Burkle Address  
Plan within that law  
was a ruling for North  
Dakota counties as of  
January 1, 1993. The  
Plan has been modi-  
fied since that original  
date, but it drives the  
911 addressing confor-  
mity; however, Adams,  
Ward, Burleigh, and  
Grand Forks Counties  
already had their own  
local Authority Rural  
Address Plans in place,  
so they were probably  
grandfathered into the  
system. Peterschick  
said, "All of the counties  
in North Dakota have  
good GIS information."  
He noted local respond-  
ers and volunteers  
also have helpful area  
knowledge. According to  
Peterschick the railroad  
being built and then  
counties being built out  
from there some coun-  
ties were in the forefront  
of getting ahead of the

problem. Peterschick  
said that their offices  
have no authority over  
mandating or compli-  
ance with addresses  
rather they are there to  
assist if address chang-  
ing does come into play.  
More research may need  
to be done, but with the  
information gathered,  
it is a possibility that  
Adams County is grand-  
fathered into the code  
responsibilities and will  
not be required to incur  
what other counties had  
to incur with address  
and signage changing.

The other three  
counties that had their  
own local Authority  
Rural Address Plans  
in place, and that were  
potentially grandfa-  
thered in all have a more  
robust population than  
Adams County. When  
interviewing with North  
Dakota Emergency  
Management offices,  
it was clarified that no  
grant monies are grant-  
ed through them for 911  
addressing expenses.

and they are the general caretaking of the flags.

Board members discussed that some of the footings aren't properly sustaining the poles, and some poles lean etc. One Board member said he would like to see concrete footings for the flag poles. Chairman, Ryan Sott said he wasn't sure there was enough dirt grounding for that type of pole stabilizing.

The representative addressing the Board on behalf of the Boy Scout youth said there other scouts might be working toward becoming an

Eagle Scout and might reach out to park main-  
tenance about possible  
solutions for better pole  
grounding. Park main-  
tenance does the lawn  
care, and they discussed  
they can't change the  
pole bases to an extent  
that would interfere  
with other park care  
that is needed.

Board members in  
attendance at the mee-  
ting voted unanimously  
to assist with the \$2,000  
needed for the 50 name  
plates. If there are ad-  
ditional costs, the troop  
or members of the troop  
may do some fundrai-  
sing for those costs. It  
was explained that the  
details of what will be  
on each sign, other than  
the state name, are still  
being discussed.

Board members also  
discussed new signage  
being needed in the  
camping area at Mirror  
Lake. The signage could  
be misunderstood with  
the wording that says  
there are full hook-ups  
because the septic and  
water isn't directly avai-  
lable for being hooked  
up. There are locations  
to obtain water but there  
isn't a water hook-up.  
It is not allowed for  
campers to drain their

septic line into the du-  
mping station the whole  
time they are camping.  
It is a tank dump not a  
camping drain for those  
recreational vehicles  
(RVs).

Discussions were  
held that they could  
work with the signage  
on a temporary basis  
and cover up the part  
of the sign that says  
full hook-ups. There  
were also concerns  
that people are misrea-  
ding the sign that give  
prices for camping. It  
was reported that law  
enforcement has poin-  
ted out signage could  
be interpreted that you

pay \$20 dollars if you  
need hook-ups or if you  
don't need hook-ups you  
don't have a charge. This  
misunderstanding could  
be the reason people are  
found camping at the  
sites when they did not  
pay to do so. A new sign  
or clarity for the sign  
that is currently there  
will be forthcoming so  
campers will have a clear  
understanding that  
they cannot camp there  
for free if they are a tent  
camper and don't need  
hookups. It was discus-  
sed further that clearer  
signage should also  
allow for easier enforce-  
ment of the rules.
