

Area teacher selected for national leadership program

With the global population now over 8 billion people, feeding and fueling the world has never been a bigger challenge. Meeting this challenge requires innovative approaches to agriculture and developing the next generation of scientists and leaders through education.

Carie Marshall-Moore of Ege-land has been selected to participate in the Teacher Leader Community, a prestigious leadership program from Nourish the Future designed to address these critical needs.

Nourish the Future is a national STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) initiative connecting students to modern agriculture. Its mission is to help teachers inspire their students to learn science, solve problems, and see the possibilities of careers in agriculture.

Marshall-Moore, who teaches at Lake Region State College and Devils Lake High School, was selected as one of only 32 teachers nationwide to participate in the year-long fellowship supported by partners like the United Soybean Board, the National Corn Growers Association, and Bayer. Industry partners fund the Nourish the Future program to help farmers educate the public on modern farming and the science behind their practices.

Nourish the Future education lead Heather Bryan summed up the

importance of connecting the agriculture industry to the classroom, "Effective STEM teaching requires real-world context, which students and teachers find accessible in agriculture."

The year-long fellowship provides Marshall-Moore with a comprehensive professional development experience, including a behind-the-scenes tour of the research happening at Bayer Crop Science in St. Louis, and attendance at the nation's leading agriculture conference: Commodity Classic. Marshall-Moore will receive free classroom resources, specialized training in leadership and curriculum development, and access to additional industry experts from companies like Syngenta. As a key component of the program, Marshall-Moore will develop and present a professional development session to share the science of agriculture with colleagues in North Dakota.

"Learning science through agriculture inspires students to pursue critical scientific careers—many of which are currently going unfilled in the agriculture industry," added Bryan.

"Through this program, Marshall-Moore is opening up new opportunities for students and her colleagues and enhancing the way we teach science."

Visitor 'wanders more' to Cando, shares some of its history

"The Duck Hunting Capital of North Dakota" was established as the county seat of Towner County in 1884, a year after the Dakota Territory legislature carved Towner out of Cavalier and Rolette Counties. Its name, "Cando," reflects the spirit of its pioneer settlers and the county chairman, P. P. Parker. Parker believed that despite the disagreements between the county commissioners regarding where they wanted to plat the judicial seat, they "could do" it. Thus, the name "Can-do."

J. A. Percival of Devils Lake is credited with laying out the townsite, which welcomed the Great Northern Railway by the end of 1888. The post office was established in 1884, the year it was founded. Only about 200 people lived there in 1890, but it became a frontier boom town over the next decade. Its population skyrocketed by 430.5% to 1,061 people by 1900, and significant improvements were made to all aspects of the city.

A 1916 business directory reported the following lines: the Thompson Realty Company, Blose & Brightbill's real estate firm, Olson's Department Store, Mrs. B. A. Clark's millinery, Fred S. Rickbeil's hardware store, the Cando Mill and Elevator Company, the law offices of Kehoe and Mosely, Shivley and Singer's meat market, the Barriball Brothers barber shop, Dr. Arthur J. Verne's dentistry, the Star Restaurant, the Bacon Brothers Farm Implement Company, The First National Bank, The Canfield Company general merchandising store, the City Meat Market, T. A. Olson's shoe store, Berry & Aronson's men's department store, the Bacon Garage, the Case Garage, Hotel Leland, and about a dozen others.

Dick Armeey, the House Majority Leader from January 1995 to January 2003 and a U.S. Congressman from Texas from 1985 to 2003, was born here on July 7, 1940. Fountain L. Thompson, a U.S. Senator from North Dakota between November 1909 and January 1910, and Dave Osborn, an NFL Pro-Bowl running back who played for twelve seasons between 1965 and 1976, also have ties to Cando.
