



need, and she works with young school children. They have always been there for me and everyone in our family and community," Mat Ollig

At the Capitol on Sunday afternoon, Laura Quam visited the memorial for the shooting victims. Quam, of Apple Valley, said she didn't know Hortman personally, but described Satur-

day's events as "tragic." Quam said it gives her "hope" to hear that people from both sides of the political spectrum are feeling the "shock and

horror" of the shooting. "Someone in their own personal home being invaded like that is just so horrific," she said. "And no person, no political leader, no politician deserves that."

Also at the Capitol, Joe Geary, a member of North Dakota's Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Nation, set up a "teardrop dreamcatcher" that he and his wife created for the lawmakers.

"This is to honor the fallen and the wounded," he said. "I didn't know them personally, but we have family and friends that live right in that same area, and everybody was taken aback ... And so hopefully this gives people just an opportunity to come and

Toepke-Floyd said the protest stayed peaceful and nonviolent, and he was grateful to the Jamestown Police Department for checking on the group.

"If people didn't agree with us, some of them expressed that but that's their right too, freedom of speech is one of the things we were expressing," Toepke-Floyd said.

One woman said she

participated to "defend democracy as we know it in the United States and the way it should be," as well as the U.S. Constitution.

"Well, really, truly for our democracy," said Dianne Conlon on why

she took part. "I want to have the freedom to do exactly what we're doing right now. And if we don't do something soon, we're going to lose this even.'
